BottleDrop now in Newport!

BottleDrop has arrived in Newport! This new system, operated by the Oregon Beverage Recycling Cooperative, for redeeming bottles and cans of which Newport is one of 25 facilities in Oregon. With a clean and spacious indoor facility, onsite staff, and a BottleDrop Account, it makes returning deposit containers and collecting your refund fast, clean and convenient.

3 Easy Ways to Return

- Bottle Drop Account Create an account at the kiosk inside the Center. You can obtain green bags from the customer service, fill it up with your deposit bottles/cans and drop it off at Bottle Drop Newport and your refund will be credited to your account.
- 2. Self Serve Return up to
 350 bottles
 and cans per
 person, per
 day in a clean
 and friendly
 environment
 using new state of
 the art reverse
 vending machines.
 Receive your
 refund using the
 onsite pay station.
- 3. Hand Count Have
 50 or fewer containers to
 redeem? A customer service
 associate can assist you by using
 their hand-count method.

3 Easy Ways to Collect

- Instant Cash When you use the self-serve vending machines or utilize the hand count service, you can receive your refund in cash (Up to \$35.00 per person, per day).
- BottleDrop Card When you sign up for a BottleDrop account, you'll get your own account card, which will be credited every time you use our BottleDrop system. Redeem your balance for cash at any BottleDrop Redemption Center.
- 3. Participating Retailer Kiosk Use the BottleDrop kiosk to print a voucher for your Bottle Drop account funds and redeem for cash at the checkout counter. OR- Withdraw your BottleDrop account funds and print a BottleDrop PLUS store credit voucher worth 20% more at

participating retailers.

Need a ride for SFW Fest? Call Pirate Taxi for a good cause

Arrrgggghhh! Looking for a safe ride to and from the Seafood and Wine Festival February 22-24? Kelli Thompson of Newport created Pirate Taxi five years ago to give Seafood and Wine Fest goers a fun and safe option back to their hotel or home while benefitting local cancer victims.

When you hop in Kelly's mini-van, she explains to all riders that the Pirate Taxi operates on their generous donation so 100% of what riders pay goes to CAN Cancer, a local appeal to provide community assistance to cover non-medical living expenses for Central Coast Oregonians fighting all forms of cancer. The fund is managed through Pacific Communities Health District Foundation.

Last year, Thompson donated over \$1,000 directly from her operation of Pirate Taxi. Since its inception, Kelli has donated over \$3,000 from the fundraiser. And no worries mate, she's a licensed and insured pirate driver!



Have you thought about your home waste station?

- 2) Make it Easy: Make it a family affair; assign jobs, color-code, label, and post special instructions per the recycling guide. Rinse out food and beverage containers to keep pests and mess to a minimum!
- 3) **Select the right containers** that work for your space and the types of items going in them.

- 1. Ditch the single use water bottle for a reusable bottle
- 2. Bring reusable bags when you shop. To help you remember, put in the front seat of your car after you unload groceries.
- 3. Carry reusable utensils instead of using single use plastic ones
- 4. Compost kitchen scraps
- 5. Participate in a beach or river clean-up
- 6. Pull out invasive plants in your yard and replace with native ones that attract bees
- 7. Use environmentally friendly, non-toxic cleaning products.
- 8. Replace incandescent light bulbs with efficient CFLs or LEDs
- 9. Carpool, ride your bike, use public transportation, or drive an electric or hybrid car
- 10. Teleconference instead of traveling to a meeting
- 11.Recvcle
- 12.Donate your clothes and home goods instead of throwing them out
- 13. Repair whatever you can before replacing with new
- 14. Use cloth towels instead of paper ones
- 15. Change your paper bills to online billing
